ARBURICULTURE Lyn Chimera, Lessons From Nature

Two Common Fall Tree Problems

Two common fall tree issues are Tar Spot of Maple and Guignardia blotch on Chestnuts. Both may look horrible, but the good news is they don't damage the trees. They're both considered cosmetic problems.

Let's look at Tar Spot on Maple first. This fungal disease arrived with the influx of Norway Mapes (not native). Tar spot is caused by the fungus R. acerinum, also not native. While tar spot can affect many species of maple, it is commonly reported on Norway, Silver, and Red Maples.



Norway Maple, (Acer platanoides) is the most common maple to have tar spot in our area. The initial infestation begins in May and June after leaves attain full size. The spores winter over on the previous year's leaves and spread with the spring winds. Moisture is needed on the leaves for the pathogen to take hold, so rainy springs tend to have more tar spot in the fall. During wet springs, like the one we just had, it usually enables more pathogen. The spots begin with pale yellow/cream rounded blotches which eventually grow into large black patches that do resemble tar spots. (See Photo) When trees are heavily infected, premature leaf shedding can occur. When leaves are shed in the fall, they tend to land with the fruiting structures facing up, allowing for effective spore release the following spring.

Guignardia blotch fungus in Chestnuts affects many Aesculus species, including some Buckeyes. The leaves of affected plants first develop water-soaked irregular areas which grow to reddish-brown blotches. These areas enlarge quickly and in a few days are reddish-brown to brown spots with clear bright yellow margins. The blotches vary in size and may frequently grow together, covering large areas of leaf tissue often causing the foliage to curl and brown. In severe cases, leaves may fall prematurely in late summer. Wet weather promotes the growth of Guignardia blotch. In the United States, this fungal disease only occurs east of the Great Plains, perhaps because of the drier conditions of the West. The Guignardia fungus overwinters on fallen Aesculus leaves and will reinfect the trees during wet weather in June. Since the foliage is usually not badly damaged until after the tree has completed much of its annual growth, the disease is primarily cosmetic.

The best way to prevent the spread of both these fungal diseases is to rake up all the fallen leaves in the fall. This removes the source of the infection. It's also helpful to thin the tree canopy to improve air circulation. Chemical treatment is not recommended since these fungi don't harm the trees.



Youth Report Dorothy

The holidays are coming! The holidays are coming!

When I was a young girl my parents use to take me to the State Fair each year. One year I learned how to make cards out of wax paper, Kleenex tissue, Elmer's glue and pressed plant material. Since then I have applied that same technique on cards, gift tags and glass ball ornaments.

First separate a Kleenex tissue into single layers. Cut two pieces of wax paper one the size of the card or gift tag and one larger. If you are going to fold your card in half, fold the wax paper in half now to make it easier find the center of the card later. Open up the smaller piece and lay it on top of the larger piece.

Mix up a solution of Elmer's Glue and water. The more glue you use will make the card stiffer. Using a toothbrush apply a little glue mixture on back of flower and place it on the card. Don't worry if there are extra drops of the glue mixture. They will be covered up. Now lay a single layer of tissue extending over the card edges. Completely cover the card with the glue mixture. If you tear the tissue just cover the hole with a small piece of tissue and add more glue mixture. Tomorrow you will never see your mistake. Place a ruler along the edges of the card and remove the excess tissue away. Add glitter if desired. Let it dry overnight. The next day use a. knife to separate the 2 wax paper pieces and remove card. If the card is not flat, you can iron the inside of the card. Insert piece of paper and add some ribbon to hold it together.

NOTE: A pressed fern leaf makes a great Christmas tree. If you don't have enough pressed flowers, you can add cutout images from last year's Christmas cards.

The cards and gift tags look great on your Christmas trees too.
