Getting Ready for the Gardening Season

I would like to share a few hints and tips that have worked well for me. Keep in mind that I am not an expert, but I DO have a lot of years of gardening under my belt and my fingernails.

- 1. To keep critters like rabbits and mice from nipping off your newly planted seedlings, cut off the bottom from some of your larger saved plastic pots (4 ½ "to 8" pots work well); place them over the plant and work them down into the soil a bit to keep them in place. The plants still get plenty of sunshine and water, but most critters won't reach inside to destroy your plant. Pots can be removed when your plants have gotten sturdy or the critters have lost interest.
- 2. For larger planting areas that you have seeded (sunflowers come to mind), keep those nibblers from snipping off the newly sprouted seedlings by placing a floating row cover or cheap netting (available at fabric stores and elsewhere) over the entire area. This lightweight covering rises with the growing seedlings and can be removed when the rabbits have lost interest in this area.
- 3. I like to create my own planting mix for containers by combining equal parts of compost with ProMix and a generous amount of slow release fertilizer such as Osmocote. If you have a huge container, consider putting some blocks of Styrofoam in the bottom before adding your potting mix. (Just avoid packing peanuts.)
- 4. Don't forget to divide your perennials just as soon as you can get into the garden... June is way too late! Plants that are divided early will benefit from the cooler, wetter conditions of spring, so... get out there and get it done!

Lessons From Nature



The primrose is one of the very first signs of spring even before they show up in our garden. I know spring is coming when I see displays of primrose in the supermarkets. It's always impossible to resist. The word primula means "little earliest one". Primrose are suitable for use in garden beds and borders as well as in containers, or for naturalizing areas in a woodland setting.



The most common primrose, Primula polyantha, is just one of the many flowering plants in the species Primulaceae which is native to Eurasia. There are around 400 species of primrose, most available only through specialty mail order catalogues. Each year it seems more unusual varieties are available in local nurseries. There are varieties with double flowers that look like mini roses and others with tall stems that have an extremely long bloom. Most common low growing varieties stay under 6-8 inches in height including the flowers, while the tall, stemmed varieties can grow over 2 feet tall.

Given the right spot primroses are easy to grow and will spread. Most prefer partial shade to filtered light with moist to wet soil. They will not survive in dry conditions. Primroses prefer cool temperatures, a rich humus soil (lots of compost and leaf mold), slightly acid soil (pH 6.5) and partial shade. They appreciate full sun in the spring but must have semi-shade to shade as the temperatures warm. Planting under deciduous trees is often a good site as they grow naturally in woodlands. Primrose may go dormant in a hot, humid summer and they often start to regrow in a prolonged warm fall and even develop a few blooms. Neither of these developments will harm the plant.

While primroses are easy to grow, they do have some issues. Snails and slugs are one of the biggest pests. Using an environmentally safe slug bait in early spring can really help. Spider mites and aphids may also attack primroses but can be sprayed with soapy water. If primrose plants are not getting enough drainage, they may also be prone to crown rot and root rot. This can be easily fixed by amending the soil with compost or relocating the plants to a welldrained site. One issue primrose doesn't have is being eaten by deer. I've been growing a few varieties of primrose for years and never had a problem.

Birds, Bugs & Butterflies

I have been a member and supporter of the XERCES SOCIETY for many years. Xerces focus is invertebrates which include most pollinators, bees, butterflies and many insects. This Society is against pesticides and is supportive of planting native gardens and meadows, among other methods of conservation.

I enjoy garden flowers and especially want to learn about native plants/flowers for pollinators. I live in the suburbs and have a regular backyard garden, focusing on perennials and roses. One of my weed-like natives has found a place in my garden and blooms with tiny white daisy flowers. It is bushy and the flowers open in late fall. It is full of bees until late November. I have my coffee in my November garden and enjoy the bee activity until I retire.

Xerces offers lists of information on native plants for pollinators and beneficial insects according to areas. I chose the Great Lakes area with its various flowers, grasses, sedges, trees and bushes. The list is coded and mentions bloom time, perennial or not, larval host, deer resistance and if it a plant can function as an insect nest site. It lists both the common and scientific names of the plants.

I encourage all to investigate the Xerces Society as it has informative articles, garden projects, Bumble Bee Study, children resources and accomplishes positive invertebrate conservation research.

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

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In Remembrance of María Gerbracht

District VIII of FGCNYS and gardening enthusiasts everywhere lost our good friend and "walking botanical encyclopedia", Maria Gerbracht on December 31. Maria arrived in the USA from Germany in 1952 under the Displaced Persons Act and became a citizen in 1956, met

her husband Elmer in College and they married in 1961. Together they have four children – all residing in NYS. Earning degrees in Chemistry and Biology and having inherited a "green thumb" from her mother, Maria proceeded to follow her intense interest in botany. How fortunate for all of us – her friends and cohorts – that Maria was always happy to generously share her knowledge.

Maria was a garden club member for 58 years. She joined Buffalo Garden Club in 1967, then joined Town & Country Garden Club where she served as president from 1977-1980 and served the club in many other leadership roles including Program Chair, Horticulture Chair, Civic Projects Chair and Flower Show Practices Chair. Maria joined the WNY Iris Society in 1979. She often entered floral designs at flower shows and the Erie County Fair, winning numerous awards.

Additionally, she was on the District VIII Board of Directors, Judges Council (as a National Flower Show Judge), the Iris Society, or Maria's long association with the Buffalo and Erie County Botanical Gardens (as board member, President 1998 to 2000, and Docent program coordinator), Maria excelled with her commitment and enthusiasm.

We will long remember and be grateful to Maria. The last paragraph of her obituary says it all. "Maria was creative, intelligent, generous, hardworking, artistic, kind, compassionate... sharing her time, energy and knowledge...."






